INTENT

Worcester State College has submitted an expedited proposal to offer a Bachelor of Arts in Interdisciplinary Visual and Performing Arts. The Visual and Performing Arts Department currently offers minors in music, theater, and visual art, and the proposed program is built substantially around these resources. The primary purpose of the proposed major is to provide students with the interdisciplinary knowledge, critical thinking skills, and creative experience across visual art, music, and theater, while also providing students with the opportunity to gain deep knowledge within one of these three disciplines. Graduates will be prepared to enter graduate studies within art, music, theater, or in emerging interdisciplinary arts graduate programs. Graduates will also be prepared for traditional entry-level positions for artists, designers, theater professionals, and musicians.

The College's mission statement cites the importance of its location in a "culturally vibrant region of the Commonwealth," as well as the importance of the College's relationship with area cultural institutions. For example, Worcester State College and the Worcester Center for the Crafts entered into an alliance that will improve the Craft Center's programming development funds and expand Worcester State College's studio and arts instructional space. The proposed program intends to strengthen and increase the on-campus events, musical and theatrical performances, art exhibitions and long-standing visiting artist and artist-in-residence lecture series for popular destinations for professional, academic, and community audiences. The proposed program also seeks to support Worcester State College's commitment to serve an increasingly diverse citizenry of central Massachusetts by providing a program that integrates diverse artistic expression and varied cultural richness.

The Worcester State College board of trustees approved the proposed program on June 11, 2007. The required Letter of Intent was circulated March 20, 2009. Massachusetts Bay Community College congratulated WSC for the opportunity the program will provide students to explore different arts disciplines, while also focusing on a specific area. MassBay indicated its interest in developing transfer agreements with the proposed program.

NEED AND DEMAND

Need

The outlook for both salaried jobs and freelance work in the arts regionally and nationally is positive. Employment for artists, performers, and arts-related workers is expected to grow by 16 percent from 2006 to 2012, while data also indicate that up to 62 percent of professionals in the arts were self-employed with varying degrees of part-time employment of their fields (*Occupational Outlook* handbook 2008-2009).

Recognizing the importance of the creative economy in Massachusetts, Governor Deval Patrick appointed a Creative Economy Industry Director to match the practical needs of artists with the business and corporate environments in mutually beneficial partnerships. The vital role of arts in central Massachusetts was reinforced by Secretary of Education Paul Reville in his address to the Worcester Cultural Coalition, where he emphasized that educational partnerships with cultural and artistic organizations would be a crucial component of the next phase of the state's

educational reform. Central Massachusetts is developing an identity around the arts. The Colleges of the Worcester Consortium has undertaken an initiative to make students aware of the opportunities for employment in the area after they graduate, including the expanding opportunities in the arts.

There are no interdisciplinary arts programs offered at any independent higher education institutions in the central Massachusetts region. Fitchburg State College offers an interdisciplinary arts and humanities major that is largely humanities-based and without a substantial applied arts concentration. The Massachusetts College of the Liberal Arts offers a similar program, but its location does not serve central Massachusetts.

Demand

Worcester State College's Office of Institutional Research and Assessment conducted an inhouse survey in spring 2008 and received 650 responses from day-time, full-time WSC students. Of the 650 respondents, 182 indicated an interest in majoring in the proposed program, which was described within the survey questionnaire. This indicated a high level of internal interest that will be supplemented by a deliberate marketing strategy.

ADMISSION AND ENROLLMENT

Admissions requirements are governed by the state and the College and include completion of a high school degree with specific coursework in math, English, science, social science, foreign language and electives; minimum GPA, plus SAT or ACT scores.

The art and theater department chairs from the Central Links Higher Education Alliance (Worcester State College, Fitchburg State College, Quinsigamond Community College, and Mount Wachusett Community College) all recently signed an agreement accepting their entire art and theater course offerings for reciprocal transfer. With the advent of *MassTransfer* in fall 2009, Worcester State envisions an expansion of such procedures connecting to the entire public higher education system.

Through Worcester State College's association with ARTSWorcester, the Worcester Art Museum, the Latino Education Institute, the Worcester Cultural Coalition, the African Cultural Center, WSC Third World Alliance, Very Special Arts, the Worcester Cultural Commission, and Centros Las America's, Worcester State will continue to expand recruiting and programmatic links to underrepresented individuals and groups.

CURRICULUM (Attachment A)

The program requires a total of 120 credits with the major requiring the completion of 45 credits. Students will be required to pursue a concentration in either art, music, or theater (27 credits); complete a set of three core interdisciplinary courses (9 credits); and elect one course within each of the three concentrations (9 credits). Within the art concentration, students will acquire fundamental knowledge and skills for creative expression via art history, design, drawing, printmaking, painting, digital arts, and three-dimensional work. Within the theater concentration, students acquire fundamental skills for creative work in acting, stage craft, design, and directing. Within the music concentration, students will acquire fundamental musical literacy and skill in a particular instrument or voice for either solo and/or ensemble performance.

Students will demonstrate their levels of achievement through the required capstone/thesis project. The projects, through their public presentation and theoretical rationale, will be related to the three disciplines, either by an artistic melding of the genres or by being grounded in a single art form whose expression is infused with substantive influence(s) of the other disciplines.

The proposed program is predicated on close, individual advisement with strongly recommended disciplinary and/or interdisciplinary internships.

RESOURCES

Faculty and Administration

The proposed program will be managed by the Department of Visual and Performing Arts, its full-time faculty, its chair, office secretary and part-time administrative assistant. Scheduling, budgeting, faculty hiring and personnel actions, student recruitment and assessment will be performed in collaboration with the offices of Academic Affairs, the Registrar, Human Resources, Enrollment Management, Assessment and Institutional Research, Facilities, and Finance.

Worcester State College has committed to the new faculty and staff positions to support the proposed program: one full-time faculty member in dramaturg/theater history; one full-time, nine-month staff technical director/master electrician staff position; one full-time, nine-month Staff Costume Designer/Costume Supervisor staff position; and one part-time administrative assistant.

Facilities

Worcester State College's Alliance with the Worcester Center for the Crafts will provide for approximately 14,000 additional square feet of studios, a small portion of which will be shared with Craft Center programming, and the major portion designated exclusively for Worcester State College instruction in painting, drawing, digital arts, design, printmaking, and especially sculpture and ceramics. Music theory and composition instruction and digital arts will share an expanded computer lab, and the theater program is examining the possibilities of the periodic use of the Center's gallery as a black box theater, as the music program is considering the same space for Chorale rehearsals. Senior studios for capstone/thesis projects will also be housed at Worcester Center for the Crafts. Additionally, the Worcester State is committed to providing shuttle service for students. The Worcester Center for the Crafts possesses a large parking lot with 75 spaces.

Library

The Learning Resource Center (LRC) houses the library, with over 142,000 volumes and approximately 1,000 current periodicals. A CD-ROM network provides ready access to several resources electronically, and a new library system will soon offer easy catalog and Internet searching capabilities. The library is a member of the Worcester Area Cooperating Libraries (WACL), a joint effort of 15 academic, public, and special libraries to facilitate the sharing of resources and provide advanced techniques in library and information science. A book delivery shuttle service operates daily during the academic year and weekly during the summer to facilitate interlibrary loans to students, faculty, and staff. BUDGET (Attachment B)

Income projections are first based on the College's standard designation per student of \$121 of tuition and \$691 of fees as income per three-credit course. This figure of \$812 revenue per student per three-credit course is used to calculate tuition and fee income over four years of the program. The other student-based income figure is the present fee of \$150 for a semester's one-on-one applied music instruction. Also projected as income are theater box office receipts and chorale ticket sales.

EXTERNAL REVIEW AND INSTITUTIONAL RESPONSE

Martha Barry McKenna, Provost and Vice President of Academic Affairs, Lesley University; and Gino Dilorio, Associate Professor, Clark University, conducted the external review. The reviewers found that the proposed program is designed to carry out the goals of Worcester State College and provides an integrated and interdisciplinary curriculum, while strengthening and emphasizing the traditional focus on literacy and liberal learning. One reviewer stated, "The new Visual and Performing Arts Major is well designed, providing an integrated approach that any college or university would find desirable."

The reviewers recommended deepening of the focus on disciplinary connections through aesthetic theory, determining the faculty who will teach the interdisciplinary VPA courses, and increasing the number of faculty currently working in the arts.

Worcester State College responded that students will have exposure through program faculty and philosophy faculty to historical and contemporary aesthetic traditions and through the College's 14-year visiting artist/critics lecture series, which offers regular exposure to aesthetics. Worcester faculty will rotate teaching responsibilities through all levels of interdisciplinary courses and will hire an additional full-time faculty member, adjuncts and part-time staff positions.

STAFF ANALYSIS AND RECOMMENDATION

Board staff thoroughly reviewed all documentation submitted by Worcester State College and external reviewers. Staff recommendation is for approval of the Bachelor of Arts in Interdisciplinary Visual and Performing Arts.

Upon graduating the first class for this program, WSC shall submit to the Board a status report addressing its success in reaching program goals as stated in the application and in the areas of enrollment, curriculum, faculty resources and program effectiveness.
