Foundational Courses

- *UMass Dartmouth does not offer State and Local Government and will give students a free elective credit upon transfer.
- *MCLA does not offer State and Local Government and will give students credit for a 300-level Political Science course.

The goal of the meeting was to have system-wide agreement on what the foundational courses are for the first two years of study in the discipline and a commitment that our campuses will accept these courses and count them towards the baccalaureate degree. Transfer professionals also attended the meeting and provided insight on a number of issues.

Disciplinary Segmental Leaders requested that faculty submit syllabi for the foundational courses prior to the meeting in order to conduct a review that would allow them to identify core course components. During the meeting, faculty agreed on the core components for American Government, Comparative Government, International Relations, State and Local Government.

Academic Transfer Pathways May 1, 2015 Convening

Massachusetts Department of Higher Education Massachusetts Bay Community College

Following this exercise, faculty discussed community college course alignment. They agreed that if a course covered a certain percent (specifics below) of the topics in the core course components sheet, it would be considered appropriate for transfer for a Political Science major.

- 80% in American Government
- 75% Comparative Government
- 80% International Relations
- 75% State and Local Government

Disciplinary Segmental Leaders agreed that identifying a minimum percent of topics covered would allow faculty to teach the courses based on their own interests and specialties, as well as accommodate for any time constraints.

The components are not necessarily in order of importance, nor does a course need to be organized chronologically to be eligible for transfer. Additionally, some of the items may be considered optional, such as public policy and media in American Government.

One faculty member asked if the topic of which courses would be considered foundational would be discussed and said he believed that Introduction to Political Science should be included in the list. The foundational courses were agreed upon during the Fall convening and since only one community college offered that course, other faculty did not think it would be beneficial to consider it "foundational" for a statewide transfer pathway. However, the equivalencies for that course would remain the same and campuses that accepted the course in the past would continue to do so unless otherwise specified.
